A hypoglycemic attack can lead to a coma or even death making these well-trained dogs real lifesavers.

The Foundation's Mission:

- To train and certify dogs to detect and alert for both low and high blood glucose levels in people with Type 1 diabetes,
- to develop training methods and protocols for Diabetic Alert Dogs
- to train diabetic children and adults for the proper utilization of their dog
- to conduct public awareness programming to businesses, organizations, schools and groups in the capabilities of a Diabetic Alert Dog and the rights of their diabetic handlers (public access)
- to provide an educational resource forum for diabetics with dogs and those interested in the Diabetic Alert Dog programs and
- to conduct training conferences to assist those with Diabetic Alert Dogs and those interested in obtaining one.

Wildrose British Labradors are known for their amazing scenting ability, temperament and trainability. Their instincts, intelligences, desire to please and smaller size make them exceptional candidates for Diabetic Alert Dogs. Through an intensive, thorough training program designed for the dogs and their handlers, these exceptional Labradors are changing the lives of people with Type I diabetes across the United States.
